
















### CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS









ATLANTA: The Friends of Mattie Freeland Park, including Mattie Freeland's granddaughter, have been integral to the design of this new park. Pictured left, Libby Hovey and Dr. Mironda Williams (Mattie Freeland's granddaughter) review construction plans with Patrick Hand of Integrated Land Design. The park's official opening is tentatively set for Spring 2022.

BALTIMORE: At Garrett Park, Greater Baybrook Alliance completed phase I and II improvements, including installation of a new walking path, exercise equipment, and pavilion. Phase II improvements began, which will include new basketball and futsal courts, stormwater management features, tree plantings and exercise equipment.

DURHAM: The Ashe Street Community Garden area was built in spring 2021during a community workday. Residents joined forces with Durham Community Land Trustees, Ellerbe Creek Watershed Association, Urban Community AgriNomics (UCAN), and SEEDS to build five garden beds. This new community amenity will serve as an educational space and tool to address food access concerns, as well as provide a home to pollinators. SEEDS and UCAN trained local youth on this day as well.

RALEIGH: Design Workshop worked with the Fund and Rochester Heights residents in a community task force to design the future Bailey Gateway greenspace. In 2022, we anticipate beginning phase I of construction to create this community-serving park entry.



### **NEW TEAM MEMBERS**





In, 2021 the Parks with Purpose team grew by two! Carmera Thomas joined as the Director of Urban Conservation Initiatives and brings a wealth of knowledge about community building and program management.

Margarita Carey, Operations Manager, Conservation Solutions, has been with the Fund for 18 years and is now working to help streamline our program operations with a wealth of financial management and administrative experience.

Despite challenges with COVID-19, we safely maintained park activation programming and workforce development opportunities in the cities where we work. Highlights included the following:

- The Friends of Anacostia Park held a soft launch celebration, a result of the Fund's support for the new Friends group.
- Anacostia Park and Community Collaborative (APACC) relied on backbone support from the Fund to build capacity and serve residents of Wards 7 and 8 in Washington D.C. APACC efforts expanded the park's stewards and "friends."
- Thanks to funding from U-Haul, we supported five \$5,000 minigrants to support capital improvements around Durham.
- Local watershed learning networks provided environmental education in Atlanta, Durham and Raleigh throughout the year.
- We worked with artists Tiffany Baker, Muhammad Suber, and Sydney Washington on art projects in Atlanta and Raleigh. These art projects highlighted culturally significant local figures.

## COMMUNITY SPOTLIGHT: English Avenue Green Team





Community engagement is one of the Parks with Purpose pillars that allows us to maintain relationships and ensure that greenspaces foster safe spaces for the families and grassroots organizations that we work with.

The English Avenue Green Team in Atlanta pressed on with park and green infrastructure maintenance. The team also worked with Park Ambassadors Annie Moore and Billie Walker on youth engagement programs in the park.



Our commitment to raising awareness about Parks with Purpose and creating peer learning opportunities for our partners continued in 2021. We partnered with Aniya Bourne of Bourne to Film to create videos highlighting our partner's accomplishments and also hosted a webinar focused on the art in parks work that we supported in Atlanta, Durham and Raleigh. The Environmental Protection Agency and Department of Interior celebrated the <u>10th anniversary of the Urban Waters Federal Partnership</u>. Erik Meyers and West Atlanta Watershed Alliance partner Darryl Haddock were invited to speak at a celebratory program about how our work contributes to improved watershed health and community involvement in the Urban Water locations of Anacostia (DC), Atlanta, Baltimore, Kansas City (MO), and hopefully Raleigh in the near future.


**ATLANTA:** We will begin community engagement around the new Proctor Creek restoration project with the Historic Hunter Hills Neighborhood Association and Department of Watershed Management in 2022.

**DURHAM:** We plan to support the Merrick Moore Community with the implementation of renderings for a future food forest area. They developed the renderings with Professor Kofi Boone and NCSU landscape architect students. Many of these students also worked with Raleigh residents on the Bailey Drive Gateway concepts.

**BALTIMORE:** We expect to complete a full planning document for the Baybrook Connector, a bicycle/pedestrian path that will extend an existing trail and connect the Brooklyn and Brooklyn Park neighborhoods.

RALEIGH: We anticipate phase I construction of the Bailey Drive Gateway will begin, including sidewalk

development and site grading preparation.
